Why Pakistan's Economic interests are crucial for strategic alliances and partnerships



- The Senate Committee on Law and came to a consensus on an increase in the strength of judges in the Supreme Court after rationalising certain factors. The committee met under Senator Farooq H Naek here at the Parliament House and discussed the Supreme Court Judges Amendment Bill 2023 (Section 2), introduced by Senator Fawzia Arshad as a private member bill.
 - The federal government has given its nod to the country's premier spy agency Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI) to intercept and trace calls and messages in the apprehension of an offence against national security. The federal cabinet has approved the relevant circular allowing a designated officer of the ISI to carry out the tracing of calls under Section 54 of the Telecommunication (Reorganization) Act 1996. However, the officer nominated by the agency cannot be of less than grade 18.

The Problem of Afghan Refugees

Pakistan planned a new phase of Afghan refugees' repatriation as Pak – Afghan relations began to intensify, after the first wave of nearly half a million deportations putting more pressure on the Taliban – led government in Kabul. However, the situation was partly defused as Islamabad decided to extend the expiry date on Proof of Registration Cards by one year till June 2025.

- The government announced a reshuffle of leadership in five electricity distribution companies (DISCOs), according to a notification issued by the Ministry of Energy. The move comes amid ongoing efforts to improve the efficiency and performance of the power sector. Dr. Tahir Masood named the was new chairperson/independent director of the Islamabad Electric Supply Company (IESCO). Four other independent directors were also appointed to the board.
- The Establishment Division is considering introducing an Electronic Performance Evaluation system to objectively assess the performance, output and repute of civilian bureaucrats. The proposed system is being devised in order to get fair assessment of civil servants, being evaluated, by their superiorsreporting officers and the counter-signing officers. It is being discussed that the Establishment Division should directly approach the reporting officer and the countersigning officer through electronic means for their assessment about the officers' concerned performance, output and integrity.
- The federal cabinet launched the "Huramat-e-Parcham Campaign" in response to protesters attacking the Pakistani embassy in Germany and removing the national flag.
- Atleast 15 killed, including 10 soldiers lost their lives in two attacks in Dera Ismail Khan and Bannu, amid escalating violence in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's southern region.
- Amid already existing concerns of arms and ammunition left behind in the United States' hasty withdrawal from Afghanistan being used by militants, a US watchdog has warned that Washington's aid might be benefiting terrorists in the war-torn country. A report by the Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction (SIGAR) said that two US State Department
