Ceasefire in Lebanon



CLAS held a webinar titled **Ceasefire in Lebanon**, on **December 13, 2024**, Friday.

Amidst the ongoing tensions between Israel and Lebanon, the recent Israeli ground invasions into southern Lebanese territories have brought widespread destruction and displacement. In response, calls for a ceasefire have gained momentum, aiming to alleviate the immediate crisis and prevent further

escalation. The ceasefire agreement, brokered through international mediation, seeks to halt hostilities and allow for humanitarian relief efforts. However, ensuring compliance from all parties remains a challenge, as sporadic violations threaten the fragile truce.

 Turkey is ready to provide military support to Syria's new Islamist-led government set up by rebels who overthrew Bashar al-Assad if it requests it, Defence Minister Yasar Guler said.

- As the incumbent government continues efforts to review agreements with the independent power producers (IPPs) amid concerns over rising electricity tariffs, Special Assistant to Prime Minister on Power Muhammad Ali has denounced the power firms for "not allowing regulators to audit their books".
- South Korea's Constitutional Court will shortly be reviewing the impeachment of President Yoon Suk Yeol over his December 3 martial law attempt, while investigators said they plan to question him this week.
- A seven-day anti-polio vaccination campaign is set to commence in Punjab from December 16. The drive will continue until December 22 in Lahore, Rawalpindi, and Faisalabad, while in the remaining 33 districts, it will conclude on December 20.
- Spaniards took to the streets following a call from the Solidarity Network Against the Occupation of Palestine and another pro-Palestinian group demanding a halt to the transfer of weapons that fuel the genocide against Palestine and a ban on the sale of military equipment to Israel.
